We're taking a deliberate "no harm" approach to the wetlands in front of our house and are being rewarded with all sorts of wildlife visitors. And we finally have room for a large straw bale vegetable garden— 25 bales last year and the same number scheduled for this year. It is a fabulous way to grow vegetables and we will be trying some flowers in bales this year as well.

What inspired you to be a Board Member? I hadn't considered being a Board Member until the autumn meeting when I was asked to stand for election. Although a bit surprised, I consider it to be an honor to be part of the team that supports the garden clubs within the district and I am looking forward to meeting many of the wonderful gardeners in our district.

What is your favorite flower or vegetable and why do like it? Now, this is a tough one. My favorite flowers fall into 2 categories, the first being those voluptuous beauties: peonies, ranunculus, and English or garden roses and the second category being the simpler but more exotic orchids. The May-Apple

I thought I would share a wonderful wildflower, Podophyllum pelatum, the May-Apple. This unique groundcover makes a mysterious appearance in April, with the tip of its furled leaves, pushing up through the soil, looking like the end of an umbrella. It's likened

to a pod, thus the Podophyllum genus. It continues to resemble an umbrella as one large, waxy white flower appears beneath this double stem umbrella.

In the summer it is replaced by an edible yellowish lemon like fruit 1½-2 inches long. Both the leaves and the roots of this plant are poisonous if eaten. Mandrake is one of its many local names. It is found in rich woods, pastures, and up to 3,000-foot altitude.

The roots are used for many medicinal treatments and two semi-synthetic derivatives are used in chemotherapy. Sales of the two compounds exceed \$200 million dollars per year.

The fruit is the non-poisonous part of the plant but must be fully ripened and seeds removed before ingestion. I have seen recipes for may-apple jelly.

LANDSCAPE DESIGN

TIME FOR SPRING CLEANING IN THE GARDEN

We're into that glorious time of year when trees bud out and many flowering shrubs burst into bloom. All but a few late-to-wake-up perennials have emerged from their dormancy, and most of your favorite annuals are available in area nurseries. Barring an unlikely very late freeze, it's safe to plant them.

Garden clubs, churches, and other organizations have their annual spring plant sales this month. These are good places to learn about plants that do well in our area and often to get cultivation information that can be difficult to pick up elsewhere. When you see a great many of the same plant, this might be a sign that it does a little (or a lot) too well in this area. These garden thugs can be frustratingly hard to get rid of.

How have last year's shrub and perennial plantings come through the winter? Are they vigorous, or do they look a little limp? And what about the size? Most of us have at least a little susceptibility to instant gratification. This deutzia was a perfect size and in the perfect spot last year. Now the area is already starting to look crowded, and the deutzia is the principle culprit. Pruning may help a little, but the only real answer is to move it—while you still can. My husband used to say—not entirely facetiously—that I should only buy plants that come on wheels, making all the relocating I'm inclined to do less stressful. I hope many of you—all, actually—are keeping a garden journal, preferably illustrated. These records come in handy in so many ways. Did you actually plant tall daffodils in front of your low-growing tarda tulips? (I blame a squirrel with a short memory span.) In a typical year, when do your grape hyacinths emerge? Did monthly spraying keep your phlox paniculata free from powdery mildew last summer? Which of your flowers and shrubs did particularly well in fall?

At the March meeting of the Germantown Garden Club awardwinning author, Bettina Mueller gave a slide presentation on 'Creating a Tea Garden.' Her book *A Tea Garden in Tivoli* was a silver award winner for Best Garden Book of 2016. The presentation focused on the Japanese garden aesthetic and how to create a tea garden in our own backyard.
