For over 90 years the Germantown Garden Club has held an annual Flower Show. The annual show consists of a design division, a horticulture division, an educational exhibit and a botanical arts division (photography).

The club follows the National Garden Clubs guidelines and rules for a Standard Flower Show which includes 6 design classes with a total of 24 designs. The show featured 24 floral arrangements, 2 educational exhibits, 99 horticultural specimens and photographs. The theme for the show was "And a Thing Called Love." The design division featured fresh and dried flower arrangements in six major groups. The horticulture specimens division included individual flowers, herbs, branches and container grown plants. The show was judged by accredited flower show judges, open to the public and admission was free.

Culminating a year of work, the Germantown Garden Club was recognized by receiving six awards. The awards were presented at the District Three Fall Meeting of the Federated Garden Clubs of New York State, Inc. at the Best Western in Kingston, NY. From National Garden Club's Inc., a CERTIFICATE OF MERIT and Purple Ribbon for the 2022 Club Standard Flower Show "Nature's Best."

# Germantown Hosts Talk on "The Indoor Garden"
