For The Holidays

For the holidays the Blue Creek Garden Club will decorate the Pruyn House, the restored circa 1830 country home of Casparus Pruyn in the hamlet of Newtonville. This year's theme is "The Magic of Toyland," featuring old-time toys and ornaments. The

decorations will be on display for the public free of charge on Saturday, December 1, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Sunday, December 2, from 12:30 to 4 p.m. There will also be also a Holiday Boutique featuring freshly made table arrangements, wreaths and miscellaneous items. The



address is 207 Old Niskayuna Road, Latham, which is near Exit 5 of the Thruway.

For the holidays, The Country Garden Club of Clifton Park will be again be decorating Historic Grooms Tavern, a beautiful historic building owned and operated by the Town of Clifton Park. Built circa 1825 by James Groom, the tavern was the site of Clifton Park's first town meeting on April 1, 1828, and has served other uses over the years, such as an inn, with the last being a general store that occupies the largest part of the building. It is now a cultural center available for community events. This year we are planning a theme that relates to the building or the surrounding rural area.

An open house for the public will be held on Sunday afternoon, December 9, by the Friends of the Historic Tavern. Our decor can be seen then, while enjoying refreshments and holiday music.

The Germantown Garden Club will present a children's Gingerbread House Contest at its annual Holiday Open House on Saturday, December 1, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and on Sunday, December 2, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m., at the Old Parsonage, 52 Maple Ave., Germantown. Come see the masterpieces that these young artists have created from edible materials. The kids really get into the spirit of decorating gingerbread houses, and it is

fun to see what they come up with. Also at this event, hand-decorated, one-of-a-kind, fresh wreaths and table arrangements made by garden club members will be for sale. Come early. The wreaths are a best-seller for the club and get sold very quickly. There will also be a Holiday Crafts Boutique with ornaments and holiday items to purchase. Proceeds from the sale benefit the club's local high school scholarship fund and other community donations and projects.

Each year, the club sponsors an Adorn-a-Door holiday decorating competition for the senior residents at Palatine Manor in Germantown. Club members will judge this event, and prizes will be awarded. The seniors are really enthusiastic about this and do a fabulous job decorating the doors to their apartments.

The theme for the Guilderland Garden Club's 2012 Mynderse-Frederick House Greens Show and Open House is "Snow and Ice." Located at 451 Main Street, Route 146, in Guilderland Center, this free


