From Our Director:

This Director is amazed at how quickly the last two years have passed as we have been launching the Central Atlantic Region of State Garden Clubs, Inc. The following are some highlights as I reminisce.

There have been two Conferences. In October 2017, a mini-Conference was held in Annapolis, MD, where the focus was directed to establishing our governing and administrative documents, such as Bylaws, Standing Rules, Conference Manual, and Mission Statement. This mini-Conference was open to the Executive Committee and invited Committee Chairmen. The format of this meeting provided an opportunity for the leadership to brainstorm various options in order to successfully guide the future of CAR-SGC. It was proposed that this format be utilized at the beginning of the annual Conference at least once in each Director's term.

The Director's Project was introduced, which built on the NGC theme "Plant America". This Director chose the theme "Plant America: Knowledge is Key to Success" since, without basic education to establish a garden, a successful bounty will struggle to materialize. This Director's main purpose was to support the NGC Schools: Environmental, Gardening, Landscape Design, and Flower Show. Another important purpose was to give back to those who have tirelessly engaged in the mission and goals of CAR-SGC and NGC by providing tuition reimbursements to qualified applicants. This Project was so well received that a line item for Education Grants was added to the budget.

A second Conference was held in October 2018 in Columbus, OH: "Something is Happening in Ohio". This very successful Conference was preceded by a Tri-Refresher, which received comments such as, "This was the best Tri-Refresher I have ever attended".

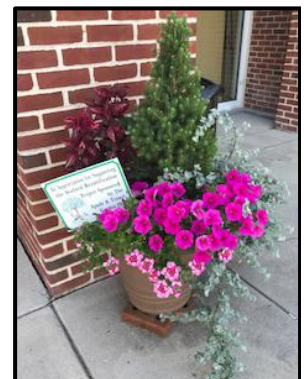


Blue Star Memorial Re-dedication October 2018

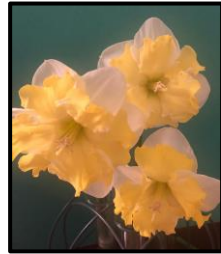

For decades, Flower Shows were regular events in most clubs. Not so anymore, members prefer to focus on the environment and beautifying their communities. This show is viewed by thousands of members of the public highlighting our organization and our members. We also offered two Flower show schools (in response to the new 2017 Flower Show Handbook changes), and a Symposium. We must be cognizant of these trends and provide guidance, education and programs that facilitate the interests of our local clubs in their communities. In that regard, we have updated our Speaker’s List, shared programs that were successful and those that were not. Our club presidents have met on a number of occasions, shared their challenges and brainstormed possible solutions.

Moving forward, clubs know GCNJ is here to help them develop and continue to be a positive force with both their membership and in their communities.

Milkweed for Monarchs Helpline/New Garden Club of New Jersey, Inc. Project

One of The Garden Club of New Jersey’s primary initiatives over the past few years is alerting our club members and the public to the emergency facing our severely declining pollinator population and the fact they provide us with one third of the food we eat. We have successfully obtained an official state butterfly, the beautiful Black Swallowtail, after a 2 ½ year campaign in 2016.

Not resting on that successful effort, we immediately launched a new initiative entitled ‘Pollinator Center Project Signage’, a series of six pollinator signs including a custom sign that listed the garden centers/museums, public/private gardens, schools and the garden clubs who provided the signage with photos showing New Jersey’s official state pollinators, the Goldfinch, the Honey Bee and the Black Swallowtail Butterfly. These signs listed host plants, nectar plants, fruit and seed plants for bees, birds, butterflies and butterfly caterpillars, and this project ultimately was awarded National Garden Clubs’ Award of Excellence at the Richmond Convention in May, 2017. The project was chosen to represent National Garden Clubs part in achieving the goal of a

1,040,000 Million Pollinator Gardens Challenge in the news release generated by National Wildlife Federation. NGC is one of the over 50 participating organizations forming the National Pollinator Garden Network and chose our project because of its “out of the box” partnering of garden clubs with garden centers and nurseries in a joint effort of educating the public on best plants for pollinators.

The Garden Club of New Jersey members came to realize through all its efforts regarding growing our pollinator population, providing plant and nectar food, that alas, when we’re too successful, and have too many caterpillars, we end up not having enough host plants to feed these hungry guys. Panic sets in big time, and an emergency call goes out. ‘The Milkweed for Monarchs Helpline’ is being launched so that help will be just a phone call away as we set up a system throughout the state enlisting garden clubs, the public, private and commercial growers in each locale providing milkweed for Monarchs, and parsley, fennel, dill, carrot tops, golden alexander and Queen Ann’s lace for our Black Swallowtails. 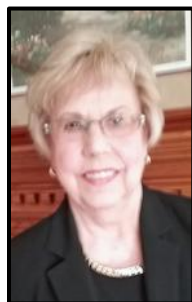

Landscape Design Consultants school and Gardening Study will complete the fourth session of their schools before our June convention. Ohio has now combined landscape consultants, gardening consultants, and environments consultants into one council. The new group is now known as Ohio Tri-Consultants Council.



Over the past year and a half, Ohio has dedicated eleven Blue Star memorials and Five Gold Star

memorials. Two Ohio memorials are being refurbished under the warranty. Looking forward, we will dedicate six more between May to September of this year. One Blue Star By-Way Marker dedication is being rescheduled. Nordonia Hills Garden Club with 69 members joined Garden Club of Ohio, Inc. last fall and is now planning and researching plans to dedicate a Blue Star Memorial.

We have awarded \$27,000 in scholarships to Ohio candidates studying in the fields of environmental studies, agriculture, natural resource management and landscape design. Many individuals have joined our Life Member Scholarship which means our account continues to grow. Donations and members giving to this account is a gift that keeps on giving and we are so grateful to be able to award these scholarships.

Two more Plant America Grants were awarded to Ohio clubs. Milan Garden Club dedicated a Blue Star Memorial Marker October 7. They will use funds to landscape the area of the Village Square with ground preparation, mulch, planting low maintenance plants, adding a bench and a professional stone walkway. Berlin Heights Garden Club will landscape an 87’ x 20’ area in front of their Oak Bluff Cemetery fence. A Gold Star Memorial will be incorporated. Four new trees will be planted along with a pollinating garden with spring blooming bulbs. Since there is no landscaping in the area, this project will add beauty along a busy highway. This addition to this historic cemetery brings honor to an unknown sailor from the War of 1812 who is buried there as well as Almon Ruggles, surveyor of the Firelands.

Our President’s Project is to Feed Ohio. Our clubs have been gathering and sharing food for 18 months and will continue into June. It is wonderful as the numbers increase to know that we are helping those 1 in 5 children in Ohio who suffer from hunger and are food insecure. The collected food is shared with food pantries, churches and places that feed the underserved. Over these 18 months, 67,229.15 pounds of food has been donated. Our members are very generous.

We have a wonderful convention planned for June 5-6. The theme is “We Want You” using the WWII military logo. “Rosie the Riveter” portrayed by Mary Ann Jung will be our banquet program speaker with

Ruth Pangrace portraying Eleanor Roosevelt. We have workshops on designing beautiful containers, gardening techniques with handicapped individuals, new designs from the Handbook of Flower Shows, microgreen growing workshops, and planting a multi-cultural planter workshop. There is a choice of Mexican, Italian or American which will consist of veggies, herbs and flowers. We will also plant a "button garden". This will relive what our soldiers did during WWII while in rehab. All of this plus the Ohio Judges Council flower show "We Need You". All divisions and classes are titled around the impact of World War II. Designs will be interpreted around themes of American Red Cross, Victory Gardens, Save & Salvage WAC (Women's Army Corps), WAVES (Women Accepted for the Voluntary Emergency Services), WASP (Women's Airforce Service Pilots), and Women accepted for the Marines Corps in 1942.

All of this and a lot more work by our wonderful and active garden club members. It is also necessary to remember our President-elect Mary Lou Smith is busy filling her board of directors.

We have gained knowledge witnessing how caring and passionate our members are with their projects and programs and have had the opportunity of making lasting friendships. Indeed, lots of things are happening in Ohio.

- New websites were formed, and most clubs publish beautiful newsletters.
- Many clubs conduct horticulture therapy with children and the elderly.
- I am amazed to see how much financial support clubs give towards the GCFP donation funds.

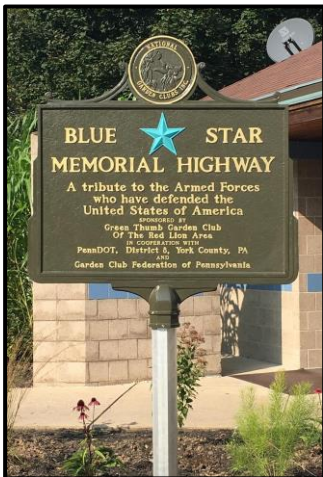

The reorganization of the region to CAR-SGC under the Plant America theme presented a new approach to giving back to the members supporting the region: the idea of encouraging members to better understand goals of the region through education. Expanding the idea of gardening to include landscape design, environment, flower design, horticulture and the knowledge of preserving the earth around us supported new goals and the CARSGC mission statement.

With that thought in mind, a proposal was presented by the CAR-SGC Director and the Director’s Project Committee. Leis; Maryland recipient L. Harris; New York recipients M. Bomba & R. Wasserman; Delaware recipients K. Batt & M. Polhemus; Ohio recipient L. Marke; New Jersey recipients T. Blake & L. Williams; and Pennsylvania recipients A. Ferguson & N. Fulk.

We wish them the best and hope their involvement in the region promotes enthusiasm for a continued successful project.

**EVERY STATE CAN WIN THE
AHS REGIONAL PERENNIAL AWARD**

CAR-SGC garden clubs are eligible to apply for the American Horticultural Society Regional Perennial Award, which may be awarded to a garden club, a group of garden clubs, a district, a council or a state for an outstanding class or section of **herbaceous perennials** in a NGC Flower Show. The overall exhibit must be of outstanding quality and include a minimum of 20 exhibits. Each state can have a winner, so a total of 7 awards is the goal.

Applying for this award is easy. The book of evidence can be done in the required 3 pages and must include the date, name of State Garden Club, name of show and location; a copy of the schedule; a list of pertinent specimens in exhibit botanically named (genus, species/epithet and cultivar, if pertinent); a clear photograph of exhibits, including staging; a clear photograph of any top awards in exhibit, if applicable.

Most spring, summer and fall shows have a class or section that would qualify. The qualifying show does not have to be one in contention for NGC or State top awards. The emphasis is on horticulture, not design or educational exhibits.

The time to gather information for this award is during your NGC Flower Show. Appropriate photographs can be taken; the botanical names of

herbaceous perennials are handy for compiling a list. Waiting until January or February of next year makes the application process challenging, rather than easy.

Applications for the 2019 calendar year are due by April 1, 2020. On the official application form, put N/A for #s 4 and 5.
