Our club's 93rd annual Standard Flower Show took place on September 11 and 12, 2021. The show was called "The Flower Power of Gardening." The top winners in the Horticulture Division were: Triona Fritsch, Horticulture Excellence Award and two Awards of Merit; Mimi Brauch, Grower's Choice Award and an Award of Merit, and the Horticulture Sweepstakes Award; and Irene Clum, Arboreal Award. Mattie Gifford and Ann Bloom each won an Award of Merit.

Considering the pandemic and the change of venue, we had many visitors that came to our show. We offered hand sanitizer and masks for people who forgot to wear one. We also had a table that included information about our Garden Club and what we do. Most importantly, we included a sign-up sheet for people who were interested in joining the Club.

We consider the last minute change of venue to be a positive change for our club going forward.

A recent meeting of the Germantown Garden Club featured a program titled "How Gardeners Can Minimize Their Impact on the Environment." The talk was led by Mary Ann Iaccino, Master Gardener Volunteer, Cornell CED. Science. She has taught school, written educational programs for seminars, and created, designed and presented programs as a museum educator. Her presentation included how gardeners can limit their impact on the environment in this world of climate change. She spoke to some of the choices we gardeners have such as maintaining healthy soils, using compost, planting the right plant in the right spot, smart watering, and rain gardens. A lively question and answer period followed.

The agenda included a discussion of the upcoming annual holiday activities. The club's annual Open House on December 4 and 5 will feature hand decorated fresh wreaths and table arrangements, the sale of holiday house plants, a bake sale, and boutique table of eclectic items.

Members will be able to purchase greens and other components to participate in a workshop at the Senior Center or on their own at home. They will be asked to submit photos of themselves with their boxwood creations or in any other festive setting. The collective photos will be made into collages, which will be used to thank President Sue Sweet, who has skillfully guided the Club through the difficulties of the pandemic.
