2011 Perennial Plant of the Year Amsonia hubrichtil Arkansas Blue Star

Amsonia hubrichtil grow 16" tall and 36" wide in a mounded form. This hardy perennial grows in hardiness zones 4 -9 and is a versatile North American native. Amsonia offers a variety of features throughout the seasons. From late spring to early summer, two to three inch wide clusters of small, light blue, star-shaped flowers are borne above ferny foliage. The alternate-arranged leaves are bright green in spring and summer. Amsonia's golden-yellow fall color is second to none among herbaceous perennials. Plants thrive in full sun to partial shade. They perform best in average, moist well-drained soil but tolerate less moisture. Once established, they can tolerate drier conditions. Arkansas Blue Star is attractive when mixed with ornamental grasses and plants that have attractive seed heads. **Perennial Plant Association**


I was one of two representatives from New York State to serve on the Federal Child Safety Committee and am presently Deputy Mayor of Schuylerville, N.Y.

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GENERATIONS GARDENING TOGETHER

A SUMMER FLOWER POWER PROGRAM

Several years ago I had a conversation with Phyllis Slusser of Ohio about her experiences with the Canton Garden Center and school children. At the beginning of the summer school break, she gave seeds to about 50 students, checked on them off and on during the summer growing season and then had them share their harvest in the fall just before school resumed. I filed the idea in the back of my memory for future use. When C.A.R. Director, Jeannie Nelson, contacted me about creating a youth project, I had an "*aha*" moment. I could finally use Phyllis's concept and build upon it. Thus was the project, <u>GENERATIONS GARDENING TOGETHER</u> born.

I have created a flyer with details/information, that garden clubs can use to establish this program. However, the basic guidelines are:

- Find a local schoolteacher willing to send home a sign up sheet. (A third grade or fourth grade class is best as they usually study plants as part of their curriculum.)
- Send home a sign up sheet with project information.
- Assign garden club members to mentor interested students. These members give seeds/ plants to participating students, set up a visiting schedule, and look in on the students during the summer offering encouragement and gardening advice.
- Finally, before the start of the school year, hold a flower show/fair which gives the children opportunities to share the harvest successes.

My mantra has always been, "Everybody has the power to matter in the life of a child." This project offers an opportunity to do just that.


Region wide we are beginning a new journey that will help communities establish new community gardens, while keeping established ones strong.

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"Memorial Garden for the Fallen for Our Heroes and their Families"

Memorial Day, a time to honor the nation's fallen heroes, had barely passed when an aircraft touched down at Dover Air Force base early Tuesday evening. It was bearing the body of one of the country's most recent heroes, lost to the war in Afghanistan.

"He's a soldier from Riverside, Calif. — Army. He died in Afghanistan in the last 48 to 72 hours," said Air Force Major Richard Komurek, a public affairs officer.

The soldier was among five members of the military whose bodies were delivered on Tuesday to the Dover Air Force Base mortuary, the Defense Department's only mortuary in the continental United States. The remains of more than 55,000 troops have been prepared there for funeral services since 1955.

The fallen California soldier's loved ones had decided to avail themselves of a program started shortly after President Barack Obama took office in 2009, through which they were able to witness the dignified transfer of their loved one's remains from the aircraft to the mortuary. Tuesday night, they may well have been the first family to find comfort in a memorial garden that was dedicated at the base just hours before their loved one's body was brought home.

A project of the Delaware Federation of Garden Clubs, the "Memorial Garden for the Fallen for Our Heroes and their Families" was the brainchild of former federation president Alice Witterholt of Wilmington, DE, who decided to make the garden her president's project during her two-year term that ended in April. When she learned that a Center for the Families of the Fallen was being created from a 6,000-square-foot former Armed Forces exchange facility to provide a comforting space for families awaiting the arrival of their loved ones' remains, she thought they should also have a garden in which to seek solace.

The 28-by-50-foot garden, which is at the corner of U.S. Route 13 and the Air Force Base's Atlantic Street, can be accessed only through the Center for the Families of the Fallen. Designed by landscape architect Rodney Robinson, it is divided into two "rooms" defined by two Virginia magnolia trees. One area has three plantation teak chairs and a bench, and the other, situated near a Japanese maple tree and a fountain softly spilling over a rock, has three benches. Small boulders provide further privacy amid plantings for all seasons, including blue plumbago, lady's mantle, hosta and hellebores.

The fundraising efforts, first documented in the Delaware County Daily Times last September, spread to 43 states with garden clubs from across the nation raising more than double the \$125,000 the Delaware Federation of Garden Clubs members had hoped for. Over \$303,000 has been donated and they are still counting.

Renee Blaschke, immediate past president of the National Garden Clubs Inc., noted at Tuesday's dedication ceremony, attended by about 90 garden club members, members of the military and other dignitaries, that the 200,000-member gardening organization was designating the memorial garden a Blue Star Memorial By-Way as a tribute to the Armed Forces of America.
