

Fox Memorial Saratoga Tree Nursery produces more than 1.5 million seedlings annually, maintains more than 200 acres for seed production and has orchards located across the state, and is currently growing more than 6 million seedlings of over 50 different species! Fascinating Facts About NY State

Did you know that bobcats are the only surviving wild feline with a breeding population In New York State making their presence truly special.

In the early 1900's they were hunted almost to extinction but thanks to the federal Endangered Species Act and conservation efforts they are quietly existing in the wild.

The DEC with researchers from the New York Cooperative Fish and Wildlife Research Unit and Cornell University are actively tracking them in an effort to discover just how many bobcats are actually in existence.

Did you know that approximately 40-50 tons of cargo on ships from all over the world travel through the St Lawrence Seaway each year. Construction was completed in 1959 and dedicated by President Eisenhower and Queen Elizabeth II.

New Uses for Plants:

Sunflowers are not just beautiful; they are also hyperaccumulators, capable of absorbing heavy metals like lead, arsenic, and uranium from the soil, making them excellent for phytoremediation. Sugarcane bagasse, the fibrous waste left after juice extraction, is increasingly being used to produce biodegradable plates, bowls, and cups, offering an eco-friendly alternative to plastic. Algae can produce up to 300 times more oil per acre than traditional crops used for biofuels, making it a highly promising source of sustainable energy.

Trivia answer: Red milkweed beetle. (The beetles feed on the sap but it contains chemicals which makes them distasteful to birds who otherwise might snack on them).
